Favorite documentary type movies or series

• "My Octopus Teacher" (2020) Netflix

"My Octopus Teacher" is a story about connection told by a free-diving filmmaker who bonds with an octopus living in a South African kelp forest.

• "Our Planet" (2019-2023) Netflix

"Our Planet" was the first nature documentary series created by Netflix. It includes David Attenborough's familiar voice. This documentary offers thrilling views and carries an urgent message. It shows the damage caused by climate change.

• "The Green Planet-Series one, seasonal worlds," BBC (2022)

The series was filmed on the South African Cape. It is colored by millions of flowers, all competing for pollinators. It shows a huge summer fire that wipes out the landscape. Thev somehow capture the very moment the Fire Lily blooms. It hasn't flowered since the last fire 15 years ago. It emerges into a world with no other life around. The pollinators somehow find these small tubular flowers. The filming is spectacular. Viewing that little red Fire Lily among all the charred ground leaves you with a sense of hope.

Favorite Gardens in Europe:

• Kew Gardens in England. I love old glass greenhouses and the tropical collections there.

• Keukenhof, The Netherlands

This is the best place to experience the splendor of bulbs blooming in the spring. Spectacular large plantings featuring some new varieties. Also, it is a short train ride from Amsterdam. You can view the fields of colorful bulbs in full bloom en route to Keukenhof.

The Ware Collection of Blaschka Glass Models of Plants

(or simply the Glass Flowers), Cambridge, Mass.

It is a collection of extremely realistic glass botanical models at the Harvard University of Natural History. It was created by the Blaschkas back in the late 1800's at their studio in Germany. It includes life-size models (representing 780 species and varieties of plants). There are about 3,000 detailed models. The amazing part is how these delicate glass models survive so close to the subway system! An added bonus is that this museum is conveniently near a great selection of restaurants.
